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District Earns United Way Gold Award

District 21 was honored May 18 by the Northwest Suburban United Way at their annual community celebration in the Chicago Hilton ballroom – receiving the Gold Award as the top educational campaign.

Every year, the employees of District 21 contribute to the Northwest Suburban United Way through payroll deduction or checks. All of the buildings and administration contribute together. This year, District 21 staff raised \$40,543.

"Over the past several years, the District total has gone up due to the concern and generosity of all our employees," said Lavonne Ellis, retiring Assistant Superintendent for Support Services." "I visit each building at the beginning of the school year to talk about the importance of giving to help families less fortunate than we are, and I have been so thrilled at the dramatic increase in donations," said Ellis, who plans to volunteer for United Way after retirement. "Our staff members are generous and caring, and always willing to come forward to help those in need, both within the school walls and beyond."

Groups who benefit from the District 21 donations include: OMNI Youth Services, Shelter Inc. for homeless children, CEDA Northwest for emergency housing, Lifespan for domestic abuse victims, Salvation Army, Catholic Charities, Jewish Federation, The Bridge for substance abuse and prevention, Clearbrook Center, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts.

"Our social workers and nurses are among those who see first hand the benefits of how these agencies help the children," Ellis said. "It's very heartwarming to see how this can make a difference in the lives of our children and families."

Maintaining the Educational Environment

District 21's maintenance and custodial staff works behind the scenes every day. Their work is largely unseen, but their efforts make the educational environment possible. Day-today operations in our schools run smoothly thanks to Operations Director Gheorghe Trifon and his staff. They make sure the lights go on, the temperature is controlled, and things are running smoothly.

"This department is a reflection of Gheorghe's personality and background," said Daniel Schuler, Assistant Superintendent for Planning. "They always look to do quality work, and they always look to do it at the best possible price. This is especially valuable because money that does not go into maintenance of facilities can be used for more direct educational goals."

"It's challenging, and I like it," said Trifon. "Our part is indirect, but we support the educational process by providing a safe and secure environment. We try to keep on top of technology and provide the safest learning environment to help children achieve the most knowledge that they can."

Ten days before Cooper Middle School's spring musical was scheduled, the stage lights stopped working. "I left Gheorghe a voicemail," said Cooper Principal Jason Klein. "By 6:30 a.m. the next day, Karl was in action. Also, Gheorghe spent a few hours with me working on the lockers. His attention-to-detail and willingness to give of his time resulted in the creation of a locker numbering scheme that will help many future sixth grade students (and their parents) along with secretaries, administrators and teachers."

Additionally, the district received a letter from the building inspector with the Suburban Cook County Regional Office of Education. Gheorghe was commended for his cooperation and open dialogue. Through his efforts, the district was recognized for schools that are exceptionally clean and safe with all required certificates and paperwork in impeccable condition.

"We try to correct situations before they get out of hand," Trifon said. "We have a wonderful crew of dedicated maintenance and custodians who take pride in their job, and if they see an unsafe situation, they report it right away. They are my eyes and ears in the buildings. They make sure everything is working smoothly."

Trifon is looking forward to a summer of getting the buildings ready for the next school year.

New Tools for Teachers and Parents

MAP Findings Put into Action

District 21's Professional Learning Community has spent the past year using a new tool from Northwest Evaluation Association called Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) to measure student achievement. MAP is a computer-based test that finds the level where each student is learning. "We have developed reading and math goals," explained Dr. Kate Hyland, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Learning. "With the MAP results, we now have baseline data that will tell us what is working and what is not. This summer we will be spending time analyzing the data to learn what it can tell us." "The implementation of MAP has been a big initiative this year," Hyland said. "We will be providing teachers with professional development so they know how to access and use this data to inform their instruction. Using MAP data will be central to helping grade level teams work together to ensure that the needs of children are met. Professional development remains important in the district, whether training teachers in the use of MAP, effective teaming, reading and math strategies, or the myriad of other school and/or district initiatives."

A New Look for Report Cards

The District will be piloting a new report card in grades 3-5 next year. "We have identified Power Standards that we feel are essential for all kids to know and be able to do," said Dr. Kate Hyland.

These standards will help teachers know where to put their efforts with each child and where the focus should be. These standards will be reflected in the new report cards.

A report card committee gathered input from administrators, teachers and parents when developing the standards-based report card. The new report card will provide parents with information about their child's growth, progress, and mastery of specific skills.

"Right now, there are many different report cards in the District," Hyland said. "We are working to make the report card reflect our District standards and be consistent from school to school. We are excited about this. It will be a good thing for teachers, kids and parents to have consistency within the District".

Welcome to New Administrators and Promotions on the District 21 Team

Dr. Candace Thompson, Assistant Superintendent for Support Services

Dr. Thompson served as Director of Student Services in Mundelein School District 120 and Student Services Coordinator/Psychologist at Naperville School District 204. She completed her doctorate from Aurora University in 2003. In District 120, she served as the District Testing Accommodation Coordinator and Bilingual/ESL Coordinator. At Indian Prairie School District 204 she implemented the Flexible Service Delivery Model Program (District 21 is currently using this model and training staff to use this model).

Rosemarie Meyer, Assistant Superintendent for Bilingual/ESL Programs

Meyer was originally hired in 1987 as a bilingual teacher aid and in 1991 became a 5th Grade Bilingual Teacher. In 1995 she was appointed as Bilingual Coordinator and in 2002 she became the Director of Bilingual/ESL Programs. She has degrees from Illinois State University, DePaul University, National-Louis University and the University of New Mexico.

Pat McAndrews, Assistant Superintendent for Human Resources

McAndrews was hired in 1999 as the Accounting Supervisor. In 2003 she was appointed Director of Business. Prior to being hired in District 21, she was the Accountant/Bookkeeper at High School District 21. She completed her Masters Degree in Education and earned her Chief School Business Official certification.

Janelle Hockett, Director of Curriculum and Achievement

Hockett was hired as a 4th grade teacher in 1994. In 2000 she became Mark Twain's Instructional Specialist and then the district Science/Social Studies Coordinator in 2002. She has recently received her master of education degree in administration and supervision from National-Louis University.

Dr. Jason Klein, Director of Technology

Dr. Klein was hired in 1996 as an 8th Grade Science teacher at Jack London Middle School. After a year leave of absence in 1999, he earned his doctorate and was appointed Dean of Students at Cooper Middle School. He became principal at Hawthorne Academy in 2001, Co-Principal of Cooper in 2002 and then Principal at Cooper in 2003 to the present.

which provides creative, exciting programs for bright and talented children entering kindergarten to 6th grades.

"We are glad to partner with The Center for the Gifted," said Kara Coglianese, Director of the District Gifted and Talented Education program (GATE). The Center's director, Joan Smutny, and I have interacted through the Illinois Association for Gifted Children (IAGC). They were looking for a host site, and we think this will be an excellent way to extend gifted classes for our students throughout the summer."
