WHEREAS the Board of Education of Wheeling School District 21, County of LOOK, State of Illinois, caused to be prepared in tentative form a budget, and the Secretary of this Board has made the same conveniently available to public inspection for at least thirty days prior to final action thereon; AND WHEREAS a public hearing was held as to such budget on the 25 day of June, 2020, notice of said hearing was given at least thirty days prior thereto as required by law, and all other legal requirements have been complied with;
